He has performed in numerous school and community ensembles including a Carnegie Hall concert with the American Youth Philharmonic, Mount Vernon Youth Orchestra and a feature at Lake Braddock's Virginia Band and Orchestra Directors Association Honor Band Hall of Fame Concert for Composition. He is also a member of the National Symphony Youth Fellowship Program. Roberts performed the 1st movement of Paul Creston's *Concertino for Marimba and Band* with The United States Navy Band at River Hill High School in Clarksville, Md. on May 10, 2002.

Navy Band Says Farewell

Once again it is that time of the year when the spring season moves into summer. Students are graduating and preparing for new challenges in their lives. As the Navy Band prepares for its summer concert season, we also have members preparing for a new challenge. Two members of the Concert Band, **Senior Chief Musicians Liz Enagonio** and **Connie Whitfield** are retiring. Their talent, dedication, commitment, and concern for others will be greatly missed. These are two very special individuals.

Background...

LE...I am a native of Montgomery County, Md. I came to music early because my parents loved and listened to all kinds of music: classical, opera, folk, bluegrass and jazz. The defining moment came when, as a child of about six or seven, I fell in love with the sound of my neighbor's son practicing the clarinet. I knew then that I wanted to play music. In sixth grade, I started playing clarinet (no surprise there!), but when I went to junior high, I didn't want to be one of that mob of 40 little clarinet players. I tried viola (never got out of first position) but decided on French horn because I loved the way it looked. My wonderful band director, Elly Briggs, was a huge encouragement, and tolerated my initial squeals and blats.

I played in Montgomery County Youth Orchestra at a time when there was a group of powerful, talented horn players. The competition was fierce, and the training excellent. I also studied privately with Sam Ramsay, who played in the National Symphony and later the Opera House Orchestra. He was a defining force in my life: passionate, musical, talented and outrageous. We were deep friends until his death several years ago.

I studied music at Hartt College of Music, receiving my bachelor's of music degree in 1975. There I had the excellent opportunity to study with Jim Jacobs, then principal horn with the Hartford Symphony, and another inspiring musician and educator.

In 1979, I returned to Washington and worked as a teacher and staff performer in the D.C. Youth Orchestra program. I freelanced and took the usual dozens of auditions for orchestra jobs. Fortunately, my old pal Sam Ramsay knew of the opening in the Navy Band that I auditioned for. I was resistant to playing in a band, wishing for that dream orchestra job, but Sam convinced

me to try. When I won the audition I was just so thrilled to have a real music job, just as I had dreamed of.

CW...I began my college career at Auburn University with the goal of becoming a high school band director.

Somehow during that time, I became more and more interested in the clarinet, and ended up going to Florida State as a graduate assistant. I was exposed to so much music during that time, and performed a wide variety of literature for wind ensemble, orchestra, opera, and chamber music. Mr. Harry Schmidt, my wonderful clarinet teacher, and Mr. Carl Bjerregaard, who conducted the wind ensemble, were my greatest supporters and inspiration. Mr. Bjerregaard also happens to be an honorary member of the Navy Band.

After a year of teaching at Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., I realized this wasn't where I wanted to be. Mr. Bjerregaard suggested I try out for a military band, and so I sent out tapes and resumes to several bands. The result was a phone call from Master Chief Musician (Ret.) Bill Terry inviting me to audition for the Navy Band. Ten days later, I kissed my parents goodbye at the airport and as I strolled down the corridor to my gate, it dawned on me that the "muzak" playing over the speakers was the Village People tune "In the Navy!" I just got this big smile over my face. I knew then that I was about to meet my destiny.

Memorable Moments...

LE...I'll never forget the utter hush in the hall when we performed the joint concert with the Russian band on our first trip to Sweden, as we rose to play the National Anthems of the three countries. I could barely play, I was so moved. Another terrible but deeply affecting event was playing for the

service for survivors of the victims of the Pentagon bombing last fall. My own sense of grief and mortality was so fresh that I could feel along with those who were there.

CW...I have so many wonderful memories of my time here, and as soon as I tell you these, two more will stand out; but at this particular moment I would have to say that our first trip to Sweden for the International Swedish Army Tattoo is one of them. Bands from six different countries were there and we had the opportunity to socialize with our counterparts quite a bit. I remember spending a lot of evenings in the smoke-filled officers club on the Army base in Strangnas. I still have many pins and other souvenirs that we exchanged with our new friends. And, of course, there was the joint concert with the Russian Army Band. That was such a great trip, and was the first

foreign travel for the Concert/Ceremonial Band since the plane crash in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil in 1960 that took the lives of 19 Navy Band members.

The other event that stands out for me took place on Christmas Eve in 1990. There had been a ferry accident in Israel and 40 American sailors died. The band traveled to Dover, Del. to play as the remains were returned home. It was an honor to be there and play for my shipmates and I was truly humbled by it all. However, that was without a doubt the coldest I have ever been in my life! We stood on the tarmac next to the plane and played "Eternal Father" as they brought the bodies off of the plane two at a time. The wind was strong and the temperature was low. Those of us who were there still remember it vividly.

Future...

LE...Who can ever see the future really, but at least for now, I will be making the career change I prepared for these last 4 years. I start work in June at USDA's Human Nutrition Research Center as Senior Research Coordinator on a dietary recall study. In the fall, I will continue pursuing my Master of Science degree in Food Science/Nutrition at the University of Maryland. I will continue to write poetry; I'm very excited because I have joined a new writer's group, so I'm feeling inspired.

CW...I am returning home to Florida and look forward to spending time with my family.

Changes...

LE...I think the band has changed

for the better in numerous important ways. The quality of players we are hiring has improved tremendously since I came in 1981. I'm also extremely happy to see the number of women we have hired, and am especially happy to see my female colleagues attaining positions of responsibility and authority in the band. When I came in, it was not uncommon to get to a job site and find there were no changing facilities for women: it hadn't occurred to the sponsor that we had any!

CW...I feel that the whole attitude of the Navy has changed for the better since I arrived here in 1981. The Navy Band is now a very young band. There aren't that many people here with more than 20 years of service. However, women were relatively new in the Navy and in the band when I first enlisted. I am grateful for the outstanding leadership of Master Chief Musicians Gail Ascione and Kathleen Chau, whom I consider trailblazers and wonderful role models for all of us.

Hobbies...

LE...I have so many interests that it's hard to explore them all. I write poetry so seriously that it may not even qualify as a "hobby." It might be my life's work. I also love photography, and am looking forward to taking a black-and-white photo course in July. I like to work out, enjoy hanging out with my niece and nephew, love to cook and garden, would like to do

Rodrigo C. Mugol, former member, dies at 59

One of the Navy Band's most talented musicians, Master Chief Musician Rodrigo C. (Hip) Mugol, passed away on April 18, 2002 in Las Vegas, Nev. from complications of heart disease. A superb French horn instrumentalist and conductor, he was the principal horn for many years and served as the band's assistant conductor.



Mugol came from a talented family of musicians in the Philippines where he began his studies under the guidance of his father, Francisco Mugol, a baritone horn instrumentalist with the Philippine Constabulary Band (PCB). At age 12 he became the youngest member of the PCB and its principal horn. He attended Rizal Central College in Manila before joining the Navy in April 1958. After completing basic training in San Diego and a short tour with the 12th District Naval Band in San Francisco, he was transferred to the Navy School of Music in Washington, D.C. for further studies. On May 24, 1960, he reported to The United States Navy Band in Washington, D.C. He retired in 1981. Mugol paved the way for many of his talented relatives to join the Navy Band. His brothers Oscar and Walfredo, and cousin Norby Clanor all retired from the band. He is survived by his wife Zennie, son Richard, daughter Salvi, and two grandchildren. Mugol was buried in Arlington National Cemetery with a full-honors ceremony on May 8, 2002.
